"Lord Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word"

"Lord, keep us steadfast in Your Word; Curb those who by deceit or sword Would wrest the kingdom from Your Son And bring to naught all He has done. Lord Jesus Christ, Your power make known, For You are Lord of lords alone; Defend Your holy Church that we May sing Your praise eternally. O Comforter of priceless worth, Send peace and unity on earth; Support us in our final strife And lead us out of death to life." (LSB 655)

On October 31, 1517, an Augustinian monk crossed a leaf-strewn courtyard to stand before the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Saxony. There he posted a series of ninety-five statements, or theses, for debate among the theologians of the Church. Little did the poor monk know that he had just set in motion a series of events that would rock the Church in Europe to its core. The monk, of course, was Martin Luther, of the Augustinian order of monks. Printers soon grabbed up his theses and had them translated into German and many other languages of Europe. Soon everyone knew who Martin Luther was and joined in the debate.

The Roman Catholic Church, at the time quite hopelessly corrupt, had no interest in debate. They wanted the monk and his concerns to be silent and go away. He was interfering with the money that indulgences were intended to raise in Germany, money that funded finally the construction of the greatest Church Christendom had ever seen to honor the graves of Saints Peter and Paul in the city of Rome. But the monk wouldn't go away or be silent.

He was judged a heretic by Church officials and excommunicated by the pope. Luther was then summoned for trial before the secular authority, Emperor Charles V, at the Diet of Worms in 1521. Luther's study of the Scriptures had utterly convinced him that he was not wrong to teach that salvation was by grace alone through faith in Christ alone (Ephesians 2:8-9), and he knew that this was, in fact, what the Church had anciently taught. He refused to recant his writings in the famous words: "I am bound by the Scriptures I have quoted and my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and will not retract anything. I cannot do otherwise, here I stand, may God help me, Amen."

Grace alone means that God loves, forgives, and saves us not because of who we are or what we do, but because of the work of Christ for us through His death on the cross, His perfect life of obedience for us, and His resurrection from the dead. Our best efforts can never be good enough to earn salvation, but God declares us righteous for Christ's sake. We receive that grace through faith alone. God even gives us the faith that trusts him by the power of the Holy Spirit for, "Faith comes by hearing and hearing through the word of Christ" (Romans 10:17). We are not saved by obeying a list of do's and don'ts, but by grace through faith in Christ. Our salvation is in God's hands. That's Good News: the Gospel. Our response to God's grace is a cornerstone of our life together as a Church here at Grace Lutheran. Free from sin (not free to sin! — Romans 6:1-14) we are invited to live out our faith with thankful hearts, eager to share the Gospel with others.

The Lutheran movement grew and spread like wildfire. Nine years after the monk stood all alone at Worms, numerous princes and representatives of the free cities stood before the same emperor at Augsburg on June 25, 1530. They proclaimed their faith in the words of the Augsburg Confession. They indicated they would rather suffer martyrdom than lose the precious Gospel of the sinner's free justification, a doctrine which had brought such consolation to them and the people of their lands. A distinctly Lutheran Church was taking shape. The heritage received from the medieval catholic Church was purified in one territory after another according to the divine Word and in conformity with the saving Gospel.

We Pray: Almighty and gracious Lord, pour out Your Holy Spirit on Your faithful people. Keep us steadfast in Your grace and truth, protect and deliver us in times of temptation, defend us against all enemies, and grant to Your Church Your saving peace; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

-after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out



LIVING A FRUITFUL LIFE

"Remain [abide] in Me, and I will remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in Me. I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in Me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from Me you can do nothing" (John 15:4-5).

Fruit characterizes the life of the Christian steward. It is interesting to note that, in the passage above, Jesus did not say, "You should bear fruit." He stated that, when we abide in Him, it follows naturally that we will bear fruit. We are the branches, and we must stay firmly connected to the Vine in order to be mature and fruitful. Jesus calls each of us to abide in Him. Only as Christ lives in us, are we enabled to bear the fruit of His character. Whether it be large fruit or small, abundant or not so abundant, is His doing. Our role is to be attached to the vine, to fit into our place--to abide

Abiding in Christ, we minister to the needs of others as Jesus, the Vine, did during His life on earth. We feed the hungry, give water to the thirsty, entertain the stranger, clothe the naked, and visit the sick and the prisoner (Matthew 25: 37-39), all in the name of Christ.

"In View of God's Mercy"

The World Book Dictionary defines mercy as: "More kindness than justice requires; kindness beyond what can be claimed or expected." Mercy is one of the attributes of God. God is not obligated to show mercy, but He chooses to do so in keeping with His nature. God shows mercy because God is "merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness" (Exodus 34:6). Because God is merciful, we do not receive our due penalty for our sins. God gives us underserved blessing after blessing.

Through faith, we understand how blessed we are that God is merciful toward us. So how should we respond to God's mercies expressed in Christ? The Apostle Paul in his letter to the Romans told them, and He tells us the following: "Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God—which is your spiritual act of worship" (Romans 12:1 NIV).

In response to God's mercy, we respond with praise and thanksgiving. In the Old Testament, one of the ways that God's people honored and thanked God for His mercy and blessings was through animal sacrifices. Animals were ceremonially killed and presented to the Lord. Jesus' death on the Cross became the sacrifice that eliminated the ongoing need for animal sacrifices.

As New Testament Christians, Paul is now asking the Romans and us to "offer [our] bodies as living sacrifices." Instead of bringing animals as substitutes for us, we offer ourselves. Through the Holy Spirit working in us, we are able and willing to respond to God's mercy by faithfully offering our lives and bodies through using our time, talent, and money in service to the Lord. Paul calls this our "spiritual act of worship."

In the second verse in Romans 12, Paul is exhorting us, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect." Paul is telling us that "in view of God's mercy" we can and should stop following the ways of the world. With the help of the Holy Spirit, we are changed and transformed into new creations (2 Corinthians 5:17) who are enabled to say "no" to the ways of the world and live according to God's will.

"Managing God's Gifts" Grace Stewardship Emphasis for the month of October 2021...

In Managing God's Gifts, we will explore how "stewardship" embraces all of life. First, we will ponder good management of God's

created order, because "the earth is the LORD's and the fullness thereof" (Psalm 24:1). Next, we will explore how we can be "good stewards" (managers) in our relations with other people, serving them in our vocations and bearing their burdens (Galatians 6:2). Third, we will consider time as God's gift to be faithfully managed so that we may "be joyful and . . . do good as long as [we] live" (Ecclesiastes 3:12). Finally, we will explore how God calls us to manage His good gift of money-which belongs to Him, not to us-in order that we may be cheerful givers (2 Corinthians 9:7). I am looking to do this stewardship emphasis Oct. 3rd, 10th, 17th, 24th....

During our October Stewardship Emphasis. Grace Congregation Members will receive each Commitment Form & a Time & Talents Survey to fill out, which you can find in your October newsletter. Please fill those out and bring to church on Harvest Sunday (Commitment Sunday) Oct. 24th or return it to the church convenient. office when (Extra commitment forms are available on the back table of the church). I ask that, as you approach your commitment decisions and how God can use your time, talents, and treasures for service in God's Kingdom and in His Church, you seek God's guidance in prayer. Let the love of God guide you in your decision.
