# Pastor's Message





#### "One in Ten" (Luke 17:11–19)

Isaiah the Prophet said, "O Lord, in distress they sought You; they poured out a whispered prayer when Your discipline was upon them" (Isaiah 26:16). That is true to this day. When danger threatens or need presses, people find the way to God. When people are confronted with the destruction of hurricanes and earthquakes, terrorist attacks and disasters, the churches are full. People who have never been to church, who haven't attended a worship service in decades, are on their knees. A tragedy is a mighty persuader! But the prophet Isaiah indicates something else: when the anguish is over and the danger has passed, people again forget about God. Gratitude is a rare virtue. "The ox knows its owner," Isaiah says in 1:3, "and the donkey its master's crib, but Israel does not know, My people do not understand."

What does the Lord think of such behavior? He tells us in our reading from Luke 17:11-19: "On the way to Jerusalem He was passing along between Samaria and Galilee. And as He entered a village, He was met by ten lepers, who stood at a distance and lifted up their voices, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us." When He saw them He said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went they were cleansed. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice; and he fell on his face at Jesus' feet, giving Him thanks. Now he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus answered, "Were not ten cleansed? Where are the nine? Was no one found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" And He said to him, "Rise and go your way; your faith has made you well."

Two thousand years have passed by since these ten men stood in that village of Samaria, but it might as well be happening now. For three years, Jesus had sought them, but they had avoided Him. But now they call Him "Jesus, Master." Human nature does not change. These people might be Americans instead of Galileans and Samaritans. When misfortune arrives and the cross presses hard, then they can find the Lord, then they meet Him in His Word, then they visit Him in His house. And the Lord is always ready to listen and to lend His aid, no matter how late we come!



Is it right to think of Him only when our need is great and beyond all other help? We wear the badge of Christians, but we are ashamed to confess it before our wise and worldly friends. We are ashamed to speak to our churchless neighbors about their spiritual needs and tell them about our Lord and Savior. Only when the floor gets hot under our feet, or the storm threatens to wreck the house do we remember what we owe to our God and what we hope and expect of Him. There is such a thing as waiting too long. There are people who have used their hands for raking in the world's goods so long that even the threat of death does not cause them to fold them in prayer. Why is it that people act this way, that we, too, are inclined to forget our God until we are in dire need of His help? The second part of today's reading answers that.

When the lepers noticed that they were healed, one of them turned around and gave thanks to Jesus. One out of ten! Jesus sadly asked about the other nine. They had gone on their way. It didn't occur to them to return to Jesus. They had what they wanted, and they forgot the One who gave it to them. Jesus put His finger on what they really lacked. To the thankful Samaritan, He said, "Your faith has made you well." He alone had that faith that brings help and salvation. Although the others had also started out on the way of faith, they went astray. They had lost the faith. True faith in the Savior cannot exist with ingratitude.

Where do we stand? Are we with the nine or with the one? There are some who for a time walked with us shoulder to shoulder, but we see them no more. They have gone. And again, Jesus sadly asks, "Where are the nine?" Where do we stand? We are always ready to pray, "Give us this day our daily bread," but do we continue, "Oh give thanks to the Lord, for He is good" (Psalm 106:1)? When sickness enters our home, we cry, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" Then, do we return with the Samaritan to thank the Lord for His help? Where is the evidence of our faith in deep gratitude to God for the mercy He has shown us and our country? Martin Luther, our church's namesake, once referred to the Gospel as a "passing rain shower," that the good news of salvation in Jesus Christ our Savior is lost due to thanklessness and ingratitude. Luther writes, "Let us remember our former misery, and the darkness in which we dwelt. Germany, I am sure, has never before heard so much of God's word as it is hearing today; certainly we read nothing of it in history. If we let it just slip by without thanks and honor, I fear we shall suffer a still more dreadful darkness and plague. O my beloved Germans, buy while the market is at your door; gather in the harvest while there is sunshine and fair weather; make use of God's grace and word while it is there! For you should know that God's word and grace is like a passing shower of rain which does not return where it has once been. It has been with the Jews, but when it's gone it's gone, and now they have nothing. Paul brought it to the Greeks; but again when it's gone it's gone, and now they have the Turk. Rome and the Latins also had it; but when it's gone it's gone, and now they have the pope. And you Germans need not think that you will have it forever, for ingratitude and contempt will not make it stay. Therefore, seize it and hold it fast, whoever can; for lazy hands are bound to have a lean year." (Luther's Works Volume 45:352).

Later this month we will have opportunity to give thanks to God for all of the physical and spiritual blessings that God has given to us. I pray that all of us would be willing to do that and offer up our worship and praise to God for all the blessings He has given. As Martin Luther instructs us in his explanation of the 1st Article of the Apostles' Creed, "I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth. What does this mean? I believe that God has made me and all creatures; that He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them. He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life. He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him. This is most certainly true."

Prayer...Dear heavenly Father, who daily cares for us and is an ever-present help in every need, we pray that You awaken our hearts that we may be truly thankful for all Your blessings, especially as we approach Thanksgiving Day later this month. Let us not grow apathetic about Your temporal and eternal benefits, but, knowing that Your goodness has provided for all our needs all the days of our life, let us remember in confidence that Your mercy is new every morning, that in perfect trust we may call upon You in every trouble and thank and praise You with a joyous heart. Amen.



## HOLIDAY WORSHIP SCHEDULE 2022



"Angels: The Ultimate Divine Messengers of Hope"

On Thursday nights @ 6:30pm at Grace Lutheran Church during the month of December we will once again be having our Advent Midweek Worship Services. The theme this year is, "Angels - The Ultimate Messengers of Hope." During Advent this year, we will focus on the messages brought by angels: to Zechariah, to Joseph, and to Mary. On Christmas Eve we will hear a multitude of angels singing God's glory and peace to shepherds. On Christmas Day, we will hear from yet one more angel: "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger" (Luke 2:10–12). Imagine the surprise of the shepherds when the sign of Christ the Lord was not a palace or a crib radiating light beams, or a baby surrounded by a fierce army of guards, the sign was just a baby in a manger, wrapped in swaddling cloths! As John declares, "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14). Even today, the Word comes to us in plain spoken words, in the water with God's promise of Baptism, and in the bread and wine of Communion. God's ways are not our ways. He comes in seemingly lowly, simple, and unspectacular ways that we end up discovering are full of His grace and truth. The season of Advent calls to us to stop, look, and listen for the Lord. # "A Son Is Given"

In *A Son Is Given*, we look at the promise of God to send His Messiah as fulfilled in Jesus. The Heavenly Father made good on His ancient pledge. - Exchange stories of family Christmas traditions. You'll learn about others' current spiritual situation and be able to share what Jesus means to you.
- Invite your friends to make new traditions this year, especially if the Christmas season is stressful or depressing. Invite them to read the devotions with you, go to Advent services, or participate in a servant event.
- Bring your friend or family member to help work at a church activity before Christmas.
   Getting to know people in a nonthreatening way makes them more likely to attend future worship.

#### What is Advent?

The church divides the year into different seasons that emphasize the life of Christ and the life of the church. Beginning on Sunday, November 27, 2022, we will enter the season of the church year called Advent. Advent is the season of preparation and anticipation leading up to Christmas, and continuing to Epiphany, January 6, 2023.





#### A Steady Reminder of God's Presence

Mark and I had been married 26 years. Our sons were 18 and 20. We loved being parents, but with our younger son graduating high school, we were eagerly anticipating the empty nest and having more time for each other.

In the fall, when our younger son started college, Mark began having stomach issues and back pain, which would linger for a few days and then disappear, only to reappear later. He also developed a cough. When his doctor ordered an MRI, the results were devastating—Stage IV pancreatic cancer, already in his liver and both lungs. Mark was only 53.

Our lives were turned upside down. I suddenly found myself trying to provide emotional support to Mark and our sons during the worst experience any of us had ever endured. I wanted and needed to keep myself together to focus on caring for Mark, but I was emotionally drained—full of sadness and terrified of what the future held. I had always been a "take responsibility for everything myself" kind of person. However, I knew I couldn't do this alone.

I talked to my pastor about it, and she suggested matching me with a Stephen Minister. I agreed, and less than two weeks after Mark was diagnosed, my Stephen Minister came for the first of her weekly visits.

It's difficult to convey how important this Stephen Ministry relationship was for me. Our pastor was wonderful, and we had an amazing amount of support from many other people, but the time I spent with my Stephen Minister was the only time in the week when I could truly focus on my own needs. She was there just for me.

My Stephen Minister let me know that, while she was very concerned for Mark, her role was to be my support—to listen and help me process what I was feeling and going through, without giving advice or telling me what to do. The consistency of our Stephen Ministry relationship was crucial in helping me cope. Her weekly visits became an anchor in my life—something I could rely on when everything else was so uncertain. She was a steady reminder of God's presence, helping me know I was never alone.

Although Mark and I chose to talk publicly about his condition, my Stephen Ministry relationship was completely confidential. I knew I could share anything with her, and that's where it would stay.

Mark's illness progressed rapidly—ten weeks of treatment, followed by six weeks of hospice, and then his passing. My needs changed as I went from being a wife to being a caregiver to being a grieving widow and dealing with everything that the loss of a spouse entails. Through it all, my Stephen Minister's love and support continued. She was there for me at every stage of my journey. It was never easy, but my Stephen Minister helped me through the most difficult moments of my life.

I really can't say enough about how much I appreciate my church's Stephen Ministry. The compassionate, consistent, and confidential support of my Stephen Minister was so important in helping me cope—and then begin to heal.

The world tells us to make as much money as we can to buy as much as we can. We are told that we deserve and need the newest and best of everything, and happiness will come from having much. In contrast, God's Word tells us, "give, and it will be given to you...for with the measure you use it will be measured back to you" (Luke 6:38). In God's economy, we receive by giving. Jesus tells us that "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35). The Apostle Paul wrote, "God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that having all sufficiency in all things at all times, you will abound in every good work" (2 Corinthians 9:8). God gives us the capacity and the desire to give, and He promises to bless us through our generous giving (Proverbs 3:9; Malachi 3:10).

# Stewardship





#### "Stewards of our God-given Relationships"

In the beginning, God created Adam and Eve in His image (Genesis 1:26) to be in relationship with Him and others. Because of their sin, we no longer live in God's perfect image as holy and sinless people, but, as He is relational, we, in spite of our sinful condition, are made to be in relationships. In order for us to be in relationship with our heavenly Father, He sent His only Son, Jesus, to redeem us through His life, death, and resurrection and bridge the gap our sin had created. God chose us in Christ "before the foundation of the world" (Ephesians 1:4).

From Jesus, we learn about relationship building. In the early days of His ministry, Jesus gathered to Himself His disciples, the Twelve who would sleep at His side, share their food with Him, hear and try to understand His words, and seek to emulate Him, their Rabbi and Master. The relationship between Jesus and His disciples involved quality time together, the opening of hearts to one another, trust and forgiveness, and interdependence.

Just as He called His disciples into relationship with Himself, so He initiates that closeness with us. He calls us with His Gospel words, "Come to Me...and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). He invites us, "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men" (Matthew 4:19). He abides with us (John 15:4); He shares His Heavenly food with us (Matthew 26:26-28); He speaks to us in His Word and through His called servants (Hebrews 1:1-2); He presents us to His Father as holy in His sight (Colossians 1:22).

Secure in our relationship with Jesus, we come to understand both our identity and purpose as His stewards, and, as a result, we are transformed into people who live as faithful stewards. Equipped by His Word and empowered by His transforming love, our stewardship is no longer limited to specific acts occurring, here and there, but encompasses our entire lives.

God calls us into a relationship in which He is Lord, and we are willing to do and be anything He chooses. Joyful in our relationship with our Lord, we no longer "live according to our sinful nature" (Romans 8:4 NIV). Instead, our hearts and minds are set on doing what the Spirit desires for us. He makes us "renewed in the spirit of [our] minds" (Ephesians 4:23), so that, in love, we reach out to all people as brothers and sisters for whom Christ died, building relationships that last into eternity.

### DEVOTIONAL PRAYER

My Loving Lord,

I ask You to increase my thankfulness: I've learned that being thankful not only brightens my day but opens my heart more fully to You: I long to encounter You in the midst of my circumstances: So I'll look for signs of Your Presence as I walk along the path of Life: A grateful attitude opens both my heart and my eyes...enabling me to see You in myriad tiny details as well as in the big picture of my life: I need to slow down and take time to notice all Your blessings...thanking You for them and enjoying Your many gifts:

I ask you also to train me in trusting You more consistently. Well-developed, sturdy trust enables me to walk across treacherous terrain without stumbling. The more challenging my journey, the more frequently I need to voice my confidence in You: "Lord / trust in Your unfailing Love." This short prayer reminds me that You are with me, You are taking care of me, and You love me forever!

I have good reason to be joyful because You are absolutely worthy of my thankfulness and trust!


