Pastor's Message

"Facts & Knowledge? Even Better, Wisdom & Faith!"

⁵At Gibeon the Lord appeared to Solomon during the night in a dream, and God said, "Ask for whatever you want me to give you." ⁶ Solomon answered, "You have shown great kindness to your servant, my father David, because he was faithful to you and righteous and upright in heart. You have continued this great kindness to him and have given him a son to sit on his throne this very day. ⁷"Now, Lord my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David. But I am only a little child and do not know how to carry out my duties. ⁸Your servant is here among the people you have chosen, a great people, too numerous to count or number. ⁹So give your servant a discerning heart to govern your people and to distinguish between right and wrong. For who is able to govern this great people of yours?" ¹⁰The Lord was pleased that Solomon had asked for this. ¹¹So God said to him, "Since you have asked for this and not for long life or wealth for yourself, nor have asked for the death of your enemies but for discernment in administering justice, ¹²I will do what you have asked. (1 Kings 3:5-12)

Do you know the story of "The Fisherman and the Genie" as told in the Tales of the Arabian Knights? It's a story of greed, fear, power, and wisdom. A "powerless" fisherman discovers a bottle amidst his nets and, upon breaking the bottle's "seal of Solomon," a "powerful" genie appears. But the genie, which some even describe as a demon, does not emerge to grant wishes to one's master. No, the genie emerges, freed from his prison to kill his liberator, and get on with his life on his own terms. The only saving hope for the "powerless" fisherman is that he uses wisdom to subdue the genie. He appeals to the genie's pride. The argument from wisdom goes something like this: "How can a genie be so powerful if he, like one as 'powerless' as a lowly fisherman, can't put himself in a bottle?" In the face of the genie's majestic demonstrations of power, his pride demands that he foolishly demonstrate his all-powerful ability to squeeze himself back into the bottle...upon which the fisherman closes it anew and casts him adrift in the ocean again. Wisdom outsmarts pride every time.

I find it interesting that the bottle was sealed with the "seal of Solomon." Solomon was known throughout the ancient world as an icon of wisdom. His name shows up even in the tales of the Arabian Knights. But the Bible has a position for him that is much higher than merely being a "sage of wisdom" or a "teller of practical tales." He is the king of Israel, the chosen people from whom the promised Messiah is to come. He prays for wisdom to lead these people well so that they might be a faithful vessel of the promises of God in order that the whole world might come to know and believe in the Messiah from the lineage of David and Solomon who would come to save the world.

Solomon is considered the author of most of Proverbs and of Ecclesiastes in the Bible. And it is true that many of Solomon's writings provide practical wisdom for daily life. But ultimate wisdom begins with the fear of the LORD (Proverbs 1:7). And the Bible's notion of wisdom involves seeking the Lord where He promises to be found on His terms. Solomon blesses the newly built temple of God in 1st Kings 8 where he says, 27"But will God really dwell on earth? The heavens, even the highest heaven, cannot contain you. How much less this temple I have built! 28Yet give attention to your servant's prayer and his plea for mercy, Lord my God. Hear the cry and the prayer that your servant is praying in your presence this day. 29May your eyes be open toward this temple night and day, this place of which you said, 'My Name shall be there,' so that you will hear the prayer your servant prays toward this place. 30Hear the supplication of your servant and of your people Israel when they pray toward this place. Hear from heaven, your dwelling place, and when you hear, forgive."

Solomon's wisdom ultimately helps us to understand our need for God and then points all sinners to the promises, mercy, and forgiveness that come from the God who came among us so that we can be saved. It's no wonder that the Apostle John uses the words "tabernacle" and then "temple" to describe the God who came "in the flesh" to save us (see John 1:14; 2:21). It's no wonder that in Matthew 12:42, Jesus reminds us that in Him someone greater than Solomon is here. And, wonder of wonders, the Apostle Paul tells the Corinthians that Jesus is God's wisdom for us, as well as "our righteousness, holiness and redemption" (1st Corinthians 1:30).

So, this New Year, pray for wisdom, yes! But pray for the depth of wisdom that comes from knowing the Scriptures and Christ Jesus by faith. Then trust and follow Him in all things. That's not just practical knowledge to "get us out of a jam" like the fisherman with the genie. That's wisdom that opens up eternal life for all who put their trust in Jesus. That's a "wisdom resolution" for this year that will last more than a lifetime.

Prayer: Dear Lord Jesus, give us the wisdom to know our need for You and then to trust You as our Lord and Savior. AMEN.

Lutherans For Life Celebration

Sunday, January 15, 2023

"Blessed For Life" is the theme for our Sanctity of Human Life Sunday on Sunday January 15th, 2023 at Grace Lutheran. "And all these blessings shall come upon you and overtake you, if you obey the voice of the Lord your God" (Deuteronomy 28:2). Likewise, life ensues as a gift indicating God's grace and a privilege affirming His favor. A blessing means speaking, a promise humbly hidden in simple words. "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed" (John 20:29). Likewise, every life has promise and purpose, no matter what size, skills, or circumstances. Blessed amounts to more than being merely happy, healthy, attractive, affluent, or influential. "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied" (Matthew 5:6). Likewise, every human life exceeds just physical functions and emotional assessments.

Blessings often issue from loved ones of significant age and experience. "[Elizabeth in her old age] exclaimed with a loud cry, 'Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb!" (Luke 1:42). Likewise, every neighbor draws us beyond appearances and expectations. A blessing implies multiplication and abundance. "I will surely bless you, and I will surely multiply your offspring as the stars of heaven and as the sand that is on the seashore" (Genesis 22:17). Likewise, even at the beginning, every human person makes our heart bigger and our world better.

Blessing consists not only of substance but of activity. "If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them" (John 13:17). Likewise, life sets love in motion and puts joy into practice. "So shall they put my name upon the people of Israel, and I will bless them" (Numbers 6:27). Likewise, every human being embodies God's creation, reflects His incarnation, and ensures His ongoing and increasing involvement. A blessing is neither earned nor deserved but received. A blessing comes from God and connects to Him. Life is what God blesses us with and what He blesses us for—life together and life forever!

Whereas, Hearing and learning God's Word continues throughout a Christian's life; and


Whereas, Every Christian bears witness to Christ to his neighbors; and

We are here to listen in *confidentiality*. Our Stephen Ministers do not know the names of the care receivers that another Stephen Minister has.

If you are interested in finding out what a Stephen Minister is and does without any obligation to ask for one for yourself or another, please contact Pastor, Jeanne Meyer, Chris Cotter or any of our Stephen Ministers at Grace.

We have walked with many different people with many different needs for the last 13 years. I myself have had a couple of Stephen Ministers at different times. When my daughter passed away and when I was going through a difficult time. There is no time limit that you have a Stephen Minister. It can be as short as a couple of months or as one of our Stephen Ministers has had his care receiver for several years. It is up to you.

This a free ministry of Grace and is available to anyone in our church or community. The Stephen Ministry program has been at Grace for over 13 years and was developed over 40 years ago by Kenneth C. Haugk a Lutheran Minister in St Louis, MO. When he decided he wanted to help the people of his congregation. And it has grown from there.

How can you get a Stephen Minister? If you or someone you know could benefit from the care of a Stephen Minister, you can talk to Pastor Taggatz or to one of our Stephen Leaders: Jeanne Meyer, Chris Cotter, Lori Kachelemier or if you want another Stephen Minister: Pat Lemmer, Gail Olen, Donna Wenzel, Beth or Dick Jackson, Adam Voss or Pauline Parker, our leaders are also Stephen Ministers.

As we look back on this past year and all the challenges that we have faced, we need to look to the upcoming year with stewardship in mind. Remember, every day is sacred: everyday presents opportunities to live more fully in relationship with God and our neighbors. Every day is for love and joy and peace and fulfillment. This month consider making resolution on stewardship of your time – how you spend every day God gives you.



Privileged to Be God's Stewards

God has called us to be His stewards (Genesis 1:28; 2:15), and He equips us as His stewards to use our time, talents, and resources faithfully for His purposes. Because stewardship is about serving, enabling, taking care of, funding, helping, and bringing hope and life to all, we should seek to have a better understanding of what it means to be faithful stewards in God's kingdom. Through faith, we become God's stewards, and our deeds of stewardship come from being stewards. Stewardship is about receiving God's blessings thankfully, managing them faithfully, and giving them generously. From the LCMS Board of Stewardship we read, "Christian stewardship is the free and joyous activity of the child of God and God's family, the Church, in managing all of life and life's resources for God's purposes."

In spite of our weaknesses and unworthiness, God honors us with the privilege and responsibility to be stewards of all that He entrusts to our care. "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace" (1 Peter 4:10). Growing in a biblical understanding of Christian stewardship is a continuing process. By our own strength, it is impossible for us to be God-pleasing stewards. In order to be God's stewards, we need the Holy Spirit to change our hearts. The Holy Spirit shapes and molds us through a lifelong process of sanctification so we can be become trustworthy stewards. With new hearts, we embrace our role as God's stewards. We become new people who are God-centered rather than self-centered. We acknowledge that God owns, controls, and sustains all things. "The earth is the LORD's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein" (Psalm 24:1). God not only calls us to be His stewards, He equips us to accomplish the work that He has prepared in advance for us to do (Ephesians 4:10).

Being a steward is a relational concept. We do not live in isolation. Our primary relationship is with God Who has created and redeemed us through Jesus. We live to love and support our neighbors, and we want them to know Jesus as we do. As God's stewards, we live in relationship with creation, so we are not to misuse the earth, the seas, or the air.

As God's stewards, it is a mistake to view stewardship as only relating to managing and giving money. As we carry out our responsibilities as God's stewards, it involves the use of money, but it is much more. God's Word tells us that our stewardship involves all of life. Through faith, we believe that God is the creator, owner, and sustainer of all things, and He has given us the wonderful privilege of being His stewards.

DEVOTIONAL

DREAM ON

That person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither-whatever they do prospers. Psalm 1:3

Most of us have dreams – like opening a cozy bed-and-breakfast, inventing something amazing, starting our own company, becoming a movie star or recording artist, writing a book, being a professional athlete, or climbing Mt. Everest. It's a sad truth, but many people give up on their dreams early on because they believe that achieving them is impossible.
