Pastor's Message

"Is Seeing Believing?"

John 20:28-29, (Where the Bible reports this interaction between the risen Lord Jesus and his disciple Thomas)... 28 Thomas said to Jesus, "My Lord and my God!" 29 Then Jesus told him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." Is seeing believing? Or are there things that are very real, even very true, that we cannot see with our eyes? Our garage doors open by unseen forces at the touch of a button. We put our food and drinks into little rectangular devices and hit the button believing that, absent a heating element or a flame of any sort, microwaves will make our food or beverages piping hot. Even the most empirical of scientists has things which he/she believes long before they are tested or visible to human eyes. One could make the case that observable science, the very scientific method we cherish today, was based on a belief that God had created and ordered the world in such a way that it could be tested, and its laws could be counted on. You might say that even the scientist has to believe in certain things before he/she could really see them.

Faith in God is a bit like that. It's not that faith in God is totally absent of data or information, for the very words of God, the gifts of Baptism and the Lord Supper engender and strengthen faith. But there are aspects to faith that are beyond our control. We are the creature; God is the Creator. He is the Redeemer; we are the redeemed. Yet faith in the God of the Bible is not merely an academic exercise. Faith in the person and work of Jesus begins to help us see the big picture of our lives here, and our lives eternally. In a paper delivered at the Oxford Socratic Club, C.S. Lewis remarked: "I believe in Christianity as I believe that the sun has risen. Not only because I see it, but because by it I see everything else."

The Founding Fathers of America believed in liberty because they believed that God had created humanity for such a life. With that faith, they began to structure a government that would honor such freedom. In many of the fundamental questions of life, "Believing is seeing!" The tension between "seeing is believing" and "believing is seeing" permeates our lesson for today. The text is about "Doubting Thomas" finally seeing Jesus as his living Savior. But it took the word of the risen Jesus presenting the very wounds of His crucifixion in order to engender such faith. But who was this Thomas character? What was he really like? Was he the skeptic that many claim him to be? Was he the pessimist? The doubter? Well, if he was, he was also tough, tenacious, and no wilting violet. When Jesus was going to journey into dangerous territory, Thomas didn't shrink back. Instead, he declared, "Let us also go, that we may die with him" (John 11:16). But it's also true that he was confused and distraught over Jesus' crucifixion. If someone tried to console him by claiming that Jesus didn't really die, he wasn't going to have any of that. He had heard about it from reliable witnesses, he felt it, He was overwhelmed by it, and no amount of wishful thinking would change that.

What he forgot was that the "believing is seeing" attitude of the believer doesn't work because of our inherent power or our wishful thinking. It works because God's gifts of Word and Sacraments deliver what they say. God's promises are always true. God's promises always come to fruition. Yes, in His time and in His way, but they always come true because He is trustworthy and true.

Maybe Thomas did you and me a favor. He wasn't going to let wishful thinking be the foundation of faith. He wanted the fulfilled promises of Christ to be evident for all to see (e.g., John 10:17-18), even if he had to look a bit foolish for that to happen. In this Easter season, take a step back from the cultural craziness of our world, the rat race of your job, and your desires to make life what you wish it to be. Then try to see the big picture of your life with God in Christ. Because He has risen, your life is redeemed; it is eternal and it also has purpose now. If your life doesn't look like that at the moment, why not take Christ's word for it first and foremost? Begin to live in that resurrection reality with its eternal blessings right here and now. Then put the power of "seeing is believing" to work by reading and trusting in Jesus's words. He is the resurrected one who did all of this for people like Doubting Thomas, and for people like you and me.

Prayer: Dear Lord Jesus, teach us to see the depth of Your mercy for us, so that we might live faithful lives of grace and mercy for others. Amen.

"By the Mercies of God'

"I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship." (Rom. 12:1)

These words from Romans 12:1–2 set stewardship in its rightful place. Here, St. Paul shows us stewardship in its proper relationship to the Lord, and what stewardship should look like in our faithful service to Him. These are good words for the faithful steward to consider on a regular basis.

Notice from whence comes the appeal! The mercies of God are the defining factor, shaping both the steward and all subsequent actions. It all begins with the mercies of God. This beginning is not some esoteric, philosophical consideration either. The mercies of God, poured out upon the faithful steward, find one anchor point in human history. The mercies of God are on full display at the cross.

On Calvary, our Lord Himself, bearing human vesture and carrying our sins and griefs, lowered His holy, crownencircled brow. But Christ's death on the cross should not be taken as a sign of defeat. Rather, by the mercies of God, Christ's death grants fallen sinner/stewards like us new life! We trace this journey each year through the season of Lent and Easter. Amid the bloody sweat of Gethsemane, the injustice of the kangaroo court in Jerusalem, the ruthless and spineless acquiescence of Pilate, and the gore of Golgotha, we see exactly what the mercies of God look like.

Everything Jesus endured should have been ours. When Jesus is forgiving and promising paradise even as He is being forsaken for us, we see true mercy! This mercy is what redefines who we are, a redefinition which happens when we are baptized. Once dead and deserving of condemnation, in Baptism we are given new life in Christ. This new life in Christ changes how we see ourselves. It also changes how we see the world.

By viewing ourselves and the world in this new way, we can start to live out St. Paul's oxymoronic call to be "living sacrifices." We know from the Old Testament that sacrifice means something dies. The bulls and goats, lambs and rams came at a high price. In the waters of Holy Baptism, something also dies — the old Adam. In our Baptism, we have already died and have been raised. This is the how the mercy of God works on us. In the dying and rising, we can be a daily sacrifice that has been made holy and acceptable to God. This is not by our action, but by His!

Paul talks about this as our "spiritual worship." The Greek word here is *leitourgos*, which is where we get the word "*liturgy*." It is this view of the mercies of God that forms our daily stewardship, and our daily worship. The mercies of God define all you do in the course of a week as a steward of the Gospel worship. It is not limited to the Divine Service. In fact, the mercies you receive in the Divine Service are what you carry out to share with the world as your living sacrifice. After spending time with Jesus, you bear His image and His glow out into the world that is full of darkness and death. You have been made holy and acceptable to Him for the purpose of showing His mercy to others. This is what makes our "daily liturgy" so important. As we live and serve, and as we seek and share forgiveness and life with those around us, we are walking billboards of God's mercy in Christ.

This is what your stewardship puts on display. None of it is about you. It is about Jesus in and through you. You can't get to this by your own efforts. It is only about the mercies of God. These mercies are the treasure that you steward in your daily life of worship!

I Began to Feel God's Love Again



Recently, I was teaching at a Stephen Ministry event where someone introduced me to "Megan". A woman in her early 30's who wanted to tell me her story about receiving care from a Stephen Minister during a difficult transition in her life. Megan prefers to remain anonymous--but she gave me permission to share her story with you so you'll know about the powerful difference Stephen Ministry made in her life.

It all began soon after I moved to a new city to lie near my family. I had just ended an eight-year relationship and was depending on them to be my support system. But a few months after I arrived, they unexpectedly had to move away----so I felt very ,very alone. Not long after they moved, my grandfather passed away. It was one of the hardest times on my life. I knew I needed to talk to someone, but I hadn't lived in the city long enough to develop close, comfortable friendships that I could depend on. My new church had Stephen Ministry. When I found out what Stephen Ministry was, I talked to my pastor about getting a Stephen Minister.

It started off a little bit slow. I wasn't sure how I'd feel about sharing deep, personal things with someone I didn't know very well. But her consistency, compassion, and care for me, really came through. I realized that my Stephen Minister was a safe person who wasn't going to share what I told her with anyone else. From there we developed a deep relationship until I felt like I could truly share anything with her. We met weekly. Sometimes she'd come to my house and we'd sit and talk, and other times we'd go walking together. During our visits, she just let me talk while she listened. As I was talking through things, I realized that it was helping me to make sense of everything that had happened and how I was feeling. She accepted my feelings, including the ones that seemed risky to share and that was really helpful.

I actually didn't need advice from her---I needed acceptance and affirmation. I had a lot of loneliness, a lot of hurts, a lot of uncertainty inside. I needed to be validated and not put down. My Stephen Minister did a wonderful job of creating a warm, caring space for me to process my emotions and work through my issues. It was a few months into our relationship, and I begun to trust my Stephen Minister with some of my most difficult issues. As we were walking around a track, with the wind blowing in my face, I suddenly realized that she was literally walking right beside me as I journeyed through my pain. I'd been struggling with some spiritual wounds that were pretty intense and needed healing--thing I didn't want to share with family and friends. But on that visit, as my Stephen Minister walked next to me, I felt safe and comfortable. So I shared my deepest hurts with her--some really painful things that I feared she might judge me for and that made me wonder if God could possibly love me.

After I told her those things, I was really nervous and dreading her response. I was worried that she would think I was and awful person. But instead, she put her arms around me and said, "I am sorry you had to go through that." And that was a turning point for me. To go from fear of judgement to a positive affirmation of care, empathy--and even sorrow for what I'd been through--it was so meaningful. That's when I began to feel God's love again. The fact that God is invisible makes it hard for me to experience him sometimes; I'd been through some very negative experiences in life that caused me to question whether God even existed, and, if he existed, whether he loved me. I truly wondered, after all the things I'd done and the mess I'd been through, if God could still love me.

I somehow knew that I needed a person that I could see and touch. When my Stephen Minister was able to share her concern and her sorrow over my experiences, God was there loving me through her. I experienced God's sorrow and God's compassion and God's love-- and it made all the difference for me.

What I needed the most was her love---to know that no matter what I shared with her, no matter what I'd done, she cared for me. Her care showed God's love for me. I needed to that there was one person in the world who knew everything there was to know about me-the good and the bad, the ugly--and still loved me. It was a tangible expression of God's love in my Stephen Minister that changed my life.

My Stephen Minister helped me get to a place where I was able to deal with my issues without her. As that happened, our visits tapered off from weekly to every other week to every three weeks. We decided to meet for the last time on my birthday, and that was a very special day for me.

Stephen Ministers do a lot of listening and ask really good questions that help you talk through your thoughts and emotions. Stephen Ministers are there for you when it seems that no one else is. The most important thing my Stephen Minister did for me was to provide spiritual care that led to spiritual healing. Doctors can take care of our physical needs, and counselors can help with our emotional needs. Pastors focus on spiritual needs, but can't possibly care for every person in their congregation who needs it. So sometimes there's a real gap when it comes to meeting spiritual needs. God used my Stephen Minister to really fill the spiritual gap.

God's love is always there, but sometimes it can be really hard to feel it, especially when you're going through a crisis. That's probably when people doubt God's presence the most, when their faith is the most vulnerable. Stephen Ministers express God's love in a tangible way that care receivers can feel. Stephen Ministers help those they care for experience God during those times in life when they might be wondering, Is God even there?

Asking for a Stephen Minister is the best thing I could have done for myself. As a care receiver, you'll grow so much through your Stephen Minister's care, concern and compassion for you. And you'll be a lot better off for it.

I would encourage anyone who is suffering, discouraged, or going through a difficult time to ask for a Stephen Minister. And if someone offers a Stephen Minister to you, say "Yes!" It is really life changing.

Stephen Ministry is a way congregations can provide high-quality care and outreach to hurting people in the congregation and community. Stephen Ministers are congregation members who have gone through 50 hours of training (and on going training monthly) to provide one-to-one, Christian-centered care. Each Stephen Minister is matched with a hurting person-men are paired with men, and women with women--and meets weekly with that person to listen, care, pray, and encourage. Stephen Ministers care for those dealing with grief, divorce, job loss, hospitalization, financial struggles, loneliness, convalescence, terminal illness, and many other life difficulties.

Introducing RaiseRight -- the new name for Scrip The same program and process, just a different name.

What is RaiseRight? It's a no-cost fundraiser that helps support the ministries at Grace. We purchase gift cards at a discounted rate and sell them at face value. Each merchant sets their own discount. The discount percentage is on the form.

How does it work? You complete an order form to purchase gift cards through a RaiseRight coordinator. Forms are on the table in the Narthex, in the church office or from a RaiseRight Coordinator. Return the completed form and payment to a RaiseRight Coordinator, who will be in the Narthex after each service or to the church office. You receive the face value of the cards you ordered. If the card you ordered is in our stock, you will receive it immediately. Otherwise, we will order the card and you will receive it the following week. The difference between the face amount and the discounted amount is used to support the ministries at Grace for our church, school and ECC.

An added benefit to parents of students at Grace School, ECC or Martin Luther High School

You will receiver half of the discounted amount we receive toward the tuition you pay. If you do not have tuition to pay, you can indicate on the form to "Support a Student" and have half of the discount goes toward a student who needs help with their tuition. For example: You purchase a \$100 gift card for Woodman's. You pay \$100 and receive a \$100 gift card. We receive a 5 percent discount, so pay \$95 for the card. You will receive \$2.50 toward your tuition. The more cards you purchase, the more tuition credits you receive.
