Pastor's Message

"Don't Forget Your Valuable!"

Mark chapter 10:17-22—17 As Jesus started on his way, a man ran up to him and fell on his knees before him. "Good teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" 18 And Jesus said to him, ".... 19 You know the commandments: 'You shall not murder, you shall not commit adultery, you shall not steal, you shall not give false testimony, you shall not defraud, honor your father and mother." 20 "Teacher," he declared, "all these I have kept since I was a boy." 21 Jesus looked at him and loved him. "One thing you lack," he said. "Go, sell everything you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me." 22 At this the man's face fell. He went away sad, because he had great wealth.

I know, you are worried about my grammar. You think the title should be "Don't Forget, You're (You ARE) Valuable," right? Or, you might think my title should be "Don't Forget Your 'Valuables," not "Valuable!" Well, I wrote the title as it was meant to be written. For this devotion, the word needs to be valuable. I meant to write that word in the singular because this lesson is talking about the one thing in your life that is the key to it all. In our lesson for today from Mark's Gospel, an individual comes up to Jesus and asks the million-dollar question, "Good teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" That's the big question; that's the one that really matters. You see, the Bible talks about life as precious, purposeful, and eternal. Those three all go together. Jesus wants you to know that your life is eternal; you are not just here today and gone tomorrow. He wants you to know that you are precious to Him, that your life matters to Him.

That is exactly what Jesus was trying to show the rich young man in our reading. Jesus offers him what He also offers to you and me today --- love, His love, the eternal and lasting love of God in Jesus Christ, and a life that is purposeful and eternal because of what He has done for you on the cross and by His resurrection. When Jesus tells the man that he lacks "one thing," He's trying to get him to receive life, now and forever, as a gift from God. He's leading him to see that a relationship with Jesus is the key to it all.

So, today, ask yourself questions like these: Is there anything getting in the way of knowing and receiving the one thing that is truly valuable for your life? Are the things of this temporary world more precious to you than knowing the love of God in Christ Jesus now and forever? Are the trinkets of the moment to be more prized than God's mercy in Christ? Is there anything more precious than knowing that no matter what you've done or where you've been, life in Him can be fresh and new today? He offers you eternal life right now as a gift, apart from any works you have or have not done. Only Christ Jesus can remove everything that stands in the way of having a life that is good, meaningful, and enduring.

Trust in what is truly valuable today -- your life in Christ! Then the very same Jesus who urged this man to follow Him urges us to live for Him as well. But, first, hear another promise from Him as you face this week. Jesus says, "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28).

Prayer: Dear Lord Jesus, it's easy to get caught up in the treasures of the here and now. Give us eyes to see that only in and through You does life become precious, purposeful, and eternal. Then give me the wisdom to follow You as I take up the challenges of today. Amen. See you in worship!

Each month we share some of Guild history...

October 9th, 1958 Grace Guild assumed responsibility for the church Nursery, with Mrs. Ball leading the effort. Fundraisers held were selling bottles of vanilla and Christmas cards from Concordia and hosting bazaars.

Missions were the Prayer and Penny project and they decorated one pound coffee cans which were filled with homemade cookies and candy for the residents of the Milwaukee County Infirmary.

Projects that Guild funds were used for were kitchen cabinets, dutch doors and plumbing for the church kitchen. Utensils and 100 place settings of china and silverware at a cost of \$6 per setting were also purchased for the church kitchen.


6th ANNUAL TRUNK OR TREAT



"Called to Be Ambassadors"

In Webster's New World Dictionary, ambassador is defined as "the highest-ranking diplomatic representative of one country to another." An ambassador of the United States to another country holds a very prestigious position. This person speaks for our country. The honor of a country is in the ambassador's hands. ON THE FRONT LINES

Stephen Ministry in Action Story of a US Army Captain

"I've given enough," U,S. Army Captain, David Rozelle told his wife, Kim, from the hospital in Iraq. Overcome by grief, he thought his ability and desire to serve were gone for good. But God had other plans.

It was on June 21st, 2003, David's life changed forever. Commander of Troop K in the Third Armored Cavalry Regiment, he was riding in a Humvee near Fallujah when a landmine exploded, damaging the vehicle and severely injuring his right foot. In spite of extreme pain and shock, David immediately thought of the safety of the 140 soldiers under his command. Hours later, doctors at the combat support hospital amputated David's lower right ankle and foot. After surgery, David was flown to Qatar, then to Germany, and finally, on the eve of Independence Day 2003, to Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington D.C., where he joined the amputees on Ward 57.

A HERO'S JOY AND SORROW

Weeks later, David returned home to Fort Carson, Colorado, arriving in time to be with Kim for the birth of their son, Forrest. In addition to becoming a father, David was also a hero, receiving three awards. But any joy was short-lived; he spent day after day lying on the living room couch in a haze of depression. Kim's love and patience and his joy in Forrest gave David the strength to move forward. A meeting with President Bush--and the President's invitation to join him someday for a run--encouraged him even more. He resolved to overcome his fears and pain by strengthening his body.

MAKING PHYSICAL PROGRESS

Eight surgeries and three months after the explosion. David received his prosthesis. He resumed rigorous physical activity and was soon fully functional. Before long, he was on the Colorado slopes learning to ski again. More sports followed--running swimming, snowshoeing, and marathons and triathlons. He encouraged others with disabilities to return to the sports they loved too.

A NEW MISSION

Physical activity provided a temporary respite, but around six months after the explosion in Iraq, a new reality struck. "I was lying on the couch icing my leg, when it hit me, it's going to be like this forever. I was slowly realizing that I was going to have to adapt my lifestyle. My heart broke. It was after that day that my mind started to heal."

David now focused on two goals: his determination to return to the Army and his concern for the needs of others with injuries like his own. The second challenge was more difficult. "I had left Walter Reed unarmed with what I needed to heal," he said. "There was no established support system to take care of me." Because he wanted to help other amputees, the Army sent him on a visit to Walter Reed Hospital. He went directly to Ward 57, where he sat, talked, and prayed with the amputees. Although they deeply appreciated his gift of time, David found their grief difficult to handle and knew he needed to be a better listener.

CALLED TO STEPHEN MINISTRY

In May 2004, David's church, First Presbyterian Church in Colorado Springs--a Stephen Ministry congregation since 1981-was preparing to train another class of Stephen Ministers. David attended an information session and applied to serve as a Stephen Minister.

Soon David was part of the congregation's eighth training class of Stephen Ministers. At each training session, he made an effort to speak with everyone there. He really cared about them and how they were doing. During the training class on grief, David talked about the grief that people experience after losing a part of their body. He shared how there can be a delay before the loss sinks in. For him it was six months before it hit him really hard that his life had changed. But it was also obvious that he worked through it well because he was so open to talking about it.

A STEPHEN MINISTER ON THE BATTLEFIELD

During Stephen Ministry training, David received notice that the Army considered him "fit for duty." He wondered where he'd want to serve. He discovered the answer when he welcomed his troop back from Iraq. As he celebrated their home coming, he realized how much he loved being an Army Captain. On June 17, 2004, he resumed command, just four days before the first anniversary of his injury. Two weeks later--just a few sessions before he completed his Stephen Ministry training--David returned to Iraq, the first soldier in history to become an amputee and then resume his command on the same battlefield.

Back in Iraq, he frequently found himself using his Stephen Minister caregiving skills. David is working towards achieving those goals. He is ministering to those at Walter Reed and working to establish an amputee center there. God continues to use David's personal experiences, caregiving skills, and unwavering commitment to serving his country and his fellow soldiers.

Are you interested in becoming a Stephen Minister?

Stephen Ministers are lay congregation members trained to provide one-to-one care to those experiencing a difficult time in life, such as grief, divorce, job loss, chronic or terminal illness, or relocation. Stephen Ministers come from all walks of life, but they all share a passion for bringing Christ's love and care to people during a time of need.

Trainees learn how to listen to, care for, and walk with those going through difficult times in life. After being matched with a person experiencing a life crisis, the Stephen Minister meets with that person on a weekly basis to listen, care, encourage, and provide emotional and spiritual support. The caring relationship lasts as long as the need for care exists.

We are going to begin a new training session for Stephen Ministers in October of 2025. The training is scheduled to take place on Sunday evenings from 6-8:30pm starting October 5th. Introducing RaiseRight -- the new name for Scrip The same program and process, just a different name.

What is RaiseRight? It's a no-cost fundraiser that helps support the ministries at Grace. We purchase gift cards at a discounted rate and sell them at face value. Each merchant sets their own discount. The discount percentage is on the form.

How does it work? You complete an order form to purchase gift cards through a RaiseRight coordinator. Forms are on the table in the Narthex, in the church office or from a RaiseRight Coordinator. Return the completed form and payment to a RaiseRight Coordinator, who will be in the Narthex after each service or to the church office. You receive the face value of the cards you ordered. If the card you ordered is in our stock, you will receive it immediately. Otherwise, we will order the card and you will receive it the following week. The difference between the face amount and the discounted amount is used to support the ministries at Grace for our church, school and ECC.

An added benefit to parents of students at Grace School, ECC or Martin Luther High School You will receiver half of the discounted amount we receive toward the tuition you pay. If you do not have tuition to pay, you can indicate on the form to "Support a Student" and have half of the discount goes toward a student who needs help with their tuition. For example: You purchase a \$100 gift card for Woodman's. You pay \$100 and receive a \$100 gift card. We receive a 5 percent discount, so pay \$95 for the card. You will receive \$2.50 toward your tuition. The more cards you purchase, the more tuition credits you
